



THE AGAPÉ FEAST (LOVE FEAST) ®

The Agapé Feast is a simple meal included as a part of a worship service based on the first gatherings of Christians after Pentecost (Acts 2:42) and continued to be practiced by the Christians of the early church (Jude 1:12). Agapé is the Greek word for the self-sacrificial *love* of Christ that reconciles us to God and unifies us as Christians. This meal demonstrates our desire to be in fellowship with one another as equal children of God (Galatians 3: 26-29). It involves a common food and a common drink, but not to be confused with the sacrament of Holy Communion. The modern use of the Love Feast as a part of worship began in the 1700s in Germany by the Moravian Church, and then slowly spread to other denominations. In the early American settlements congregations were often served the sacraments by an occasional visit of a traveling pastor, and therefore the Love Feast became a common alternative to communion for those times when no pastor was available to consecrate the communion elements. The use of the Love Feast has become increasingly practiced during the COVID-19 pandemic as alternative meal to communion, as a way to share in a meal of community with God and with one another, through virtual electronic means, without the need to have consecrated bread and wine/grape juice.

{For the following Love Feast, we invite you to share in a simple meal together virtually over the live stream and in spirit through Christ}.

{Both the food and the drink is your choice, but should be something common and simple.

Examples of food include: a pastry, doughnut, pancake, French toast, biscuit, muffin, cookie, cracker, dinner roll, or sticky bun.

Examples of drink include: water, coffee, tea, orange juice, or lemonade}.

{Bread cubes, wafers, wine, and grape juice are ok, but are generally not used, so as not to confuse the Love Feast with the Lord's Supper}.

GREETING (Leader)

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we have all come to this place frail and broken. In a world of violence, hate, greed, and isolation, we come together as a church searching to find the way forward, we look for healing through this restorative service of old. It is in this Agapé Feast where adversaries become friends, friends become neighbors, and the Christian family embraces all.

The history of the feast, as a celebration born simply out of love, generosity, and fellowship is beautiful. At its most basic, the love feast is an experience of warmth and sharing, a commemoration of the early church. At its most symbolic, the love feast is a means of God's grace that is experienced in the fellowship with each other and with God. But the simplest explanation of the love feast, to which one can respond when asked, is that it is a way to remember Christ's presence on earth, and to celebrate with gratitude the spirit of God's love.

In times and places when Christians are unable to partake of Holy Communion, many people share in a tradition called the Love Feast. Sisters and brothers, we are always hungry and thirsty for Christ's love. One thing we know about Jesus is how he intentionally gathered at a table or in a field or even along the seashore to break bread, to nourish both body and spirit. This is what Jesus did on that final night before his passion. He gathered in love with those who would betray him, those who would deny him, those who would abandon him. He held together this humble community with the steadfast love of God in him. Jesus gathered them to share his love and to encourage them.

Today we gather at a distance, united in Christ's love. We all need food; we all need drink. We are equal before God; we are equal as we share in this meal of love together. This simple food and drink unite us as sisters and brothers in Christ. May this service and this meal not only nourish our bodies, but also our spirits and the bonds of love between us.



The Flow of the Worship Service

Our worship service has an intentional order to it. The flow of worship is called the liturgical movement. The movement reminds us weekly of our journey in faith of moving from being separated from God by sin, to being restored by God's grace as disciples of Christ. It is based on the sixth chapter of the Biblical book of Isaiah.

- (1) God welcomes us and invites us
- (2) We respond to God's call by worshiping Him
- (3) We confess our need for God's forgiveness and grace
- (4) We are assured of God's forgiveness and grace
- (5) We learn more about God's will through scripture, song, and sermon
- (6) We grow closer to God and one another through prayer
- (7) We give God thanks by offering our time, talent, and treasure
- (8) God sends us into the world to share His love and grace with others

About Today

Church Season: Pentecost -which is the season of the church in mission. It is the time between the ascension of Christ and his second coming, which is the time we are presently living in today, and as such is the longest season of the church year. The day of Pentecost is the birthday of the Christian church.

Color of the Paraments (cloths on the altar and pulpit):

Green - symbolizing the life God brings, especially through our mission work.

The suggested scripture lessons are from the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL), which selects passages throughout the Bible over a three year cycle. The RCL is the most common lectionary used by Christian churches. We are in **Year B**, which emphasizes the Gospel of Mark.

The Bible is in two sections: Old Testament - OT (scripture prior to Christ's birth), located in the first 2/3 of the Bible; and New Testament - NT (about Christ & early church).

This Sunday, July 25, 2021, Lectionary Reading for Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

2 Samuel 11:1-15 and Psalm 14; 2 Kings 4:42-44 and Psalm 145:10-18; Ephesians 3:14-21; John 6:1-21

The Second Book of Samuel

This OT book, bears the name of the prophet Samuel. This book takes place during the rule of the second king of Israel, David (ruling from 1000-961 B.C.). Two important themes within this book are that of the a nation's relationship with God and good rule of people; and secondly, the complexity of individual relationships with God. Samuel was the prophet anointed King David. In Hebrew, the word prophet literally means "spokesperson." A prophet is one who acts as an intermediary, called by God to speak to God's people, usually to bring those people back in line with God's will.

Psalm 14

In this OT song, we hear that it is fools who say there is no God. We express our confidence in the providence of God, as God helps to protect the poor and innocent in the face of evil.

The Book of Second Kings

During the Middle Ages, the Book of Kings was divided into two parts. The first book provides a history of the Israelite people and their theological struggles from the death of King David (970 B.C.). The first book continues through the reign of King Solomon; to the division of Israel into the two kingdoms of Israel and Judah; and to the death of King Ahab and the beginning of the rule of his son Ahaziah. The second book begins with Ahaziah's rule (850-849 BC); to the Assyrian's destruction of Samaria (721 B.C.), which was the capital of the Northern Kingdom; to the invasion of the Babylonians and the fall of Jerusalem (586 B.C.), which was the capital of the Southern Kingdom, resulting in a period of Jewish exile.

Psalm 145

This OT song attributed to David, gives praise for the greatness and goodness of God. In its original Hebrew, it has an alphabetic acrostic form, which means that every other verse begins with a successive letter of the alphabet.

The Letter of Paul to the Ephesians

The Epistle (letter) to the Gentile church in Ephesus is attributed to the Apostle Paul, written in the first century A.D. This is an open letter to many churches in response for the life-changing radical transformation in our personal and social life as we become a part of Christ's family. Paul was a Christian, Jew, Pharisee, Roman citizen, and leader in the Christian church, who had a direct encounter with Jesus Christ on the road to Damascus after Jesus' ascension into heaven. He wrote more of the NT than any other person. The title of this letter "Hebrews" presumably refers to the original audience of this letter as primarily Jewish-Christian.

The Gospel According to John

John is the latest of the four Gospels, written around 80-90 A.D. probably in Ephesus, and attributed to John the son of Zebedee, the beloved disciple of Jesus. This Gospel was "written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and through believing you may have life in his name" (20:31).
